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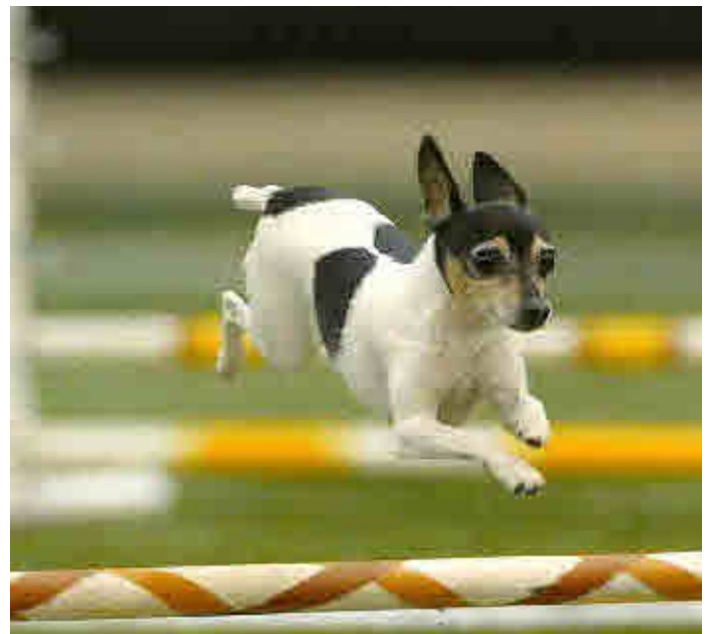

Registration Options & Advocacy: The Path to 100%

By now, we hope that you have seen AKC's recent messages regarding the importance of registration. If you have not, here they are in a nutshell: **Every registration makes a difference to everyone involved in the world of purebred dogs.** Registrations help AKC maintain a strong legislative influence, fund canine health research, provide for disaster preparedness and relief, and promote responsible dog ownership. The best way to ensure that our traditions remain strong is for breeders like you to ensure that every puppy you produce is AKC registered.

For a long time, conventional thinking among breeders has been that AKC registration was only required if a puppy they bred was going to compete in the field or the show ring. However, breeders are realizing that registrations are the foundation for our sports and support AKC's good works. "I used to think that the only time I needed to make sure a puppy I sold was registered was if it was going to a show home." said Mary Ellen Fishler, Delegate of the Poodle Club of America. "But recently I learned why every dog needs to be registered. From contributing to canine health research to supporting our efforts against radical legislation, funding provided by AKC registrations makes a difference...for all of us and our dogs. I love our sport, and want to ensure a strong future for it. The easiest way for me to do that is through AKC registrations."

Achieving 100% registration for your puppies

has never been easier because of our many Full Litter registration options available! The *Full Litter Registration* option allows breeders to individually register all the puppies in a litter to themselves at the time of litter registration for a discounted price. With the *Full Litter Offspring* process, breeders who have already registered their litters with the AKC have a second opportunity to individually register all the puppies in the litter to themselves at a discount, even though the breeder originally selected traditional litter registration.

The newly-introduced *Full Litter PLUS* registration allows breeders to register all puppies from a litter at the time of litter registration, each either in the name of the breeder or of the new puppy buyers.

Lastly, the *Full Litter Offspring PLUS* form allows breeders to register all the puppies in a litter after it's been registered, each either in the name of the breeder or of the new puppy buyers. For either of the last two options, if a puppy is not named at time of registration, AKC will later contact the new puppy buyers to get the name of their puppy. If these registration options aren't the right fit for you, the traditional, two-tier registration process remains a great choice. This can be easily completed when a new owner picks up their puppy. **Because breeders are advocates for registration, new owners will register with AKC if advised by the breeder to do so.** When you complete the sales contract and review health information with the new

owner, take the additional step of completing the registration process. It's simple—fill out the registration paperwork, collect the appropriate payment, and return it to AKC. If internet access is available, registering the puppy using AKC's online dog registration is even quicker! (And for breeders who sell their puppies with a spay/neuter agreement, Limited Registration at the time of sale is available.) Breeders can tell new owners of the many benefits they and their puppy will receive from AKC registration—a complimentary trial of pet

healthcare, a certificate for a free first time veterinary visit, AKC's New Puppy Handbook, a frameable certificate and more—and about the good works their registration dollars go to.

Do the Dew(claws)?

I am a vet that works exclusively with performance dogs, developing rehabilitation programs for injured dogs or dogs that have had surgery as a result of performance-related injuries. I have seen many dogs now, especially field trial/hunt test and agility dogs, that have had chronic carpal arthritis, frequently so severe that they have to be retired or at least carefully managed for the rest of their careers. Of the over 30 dogs I have seen with carpal arthritis, only one has had dewclaws. The others have all had them removed.

If you look at an anatomy book (Miller's Guide to the Anatomy of Dogs is an excellent one – see figure below) you will see that there are 5 tendons attached to the dewclaw. Of course, at the other end of a tendon is a muscle, and that means that if you cut off the dew claws, there are 5 muscle bundles that will become atrophied from disuse.

Those muscles indicate that the dewclaws have a function. That function is to prevent torque on the leg. Each time the foot lands on the ground, particularly when the dog is cantering or galloping, the dewclaw is in touch with the ground. If the dog then needs to turn, the dewclaw digs into the ground to support the lower leg and prevent torque. If the dog doesn't have a dewclaw, the leg twists. A lifetime of that and the result can be carpal arthritis. Remember: the dog is doing the activity regardless, and the pressures on the leg have to go somewhere. They can be absorbed by the dewclaw, or they will move up and down the leg to the toes, carpus, elbow, and shoulders.

Perhaps you are thinking, "I never have had one of my dogs have carpal pain or arthritis." Well, we need to remember that dogs, by their very nature, do not tell us about mild to moderate pain. If a dog was to be asked by an emergency room nurse to give the level of his pain on a scale from 0 to 10, with 10 being the worst, their scale would be 0, 0, 0, 0, 0, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10. Most of our dogs, especially if they deal with pain that is of gradual onset, just deal with it and don't complain unless it is excruciating. But when I palpate the carpal joints of older dogs without dewclaws, I almost always elicit pain with relatively minimal manipulation.

As to the possibility of injuries to dew claws; most veterinarians will say that such injuries actually are not very common at all. And if they do occur, then they are dealt with like any other injury. In my opinion, it is far better to deal with an injury than to cut the dew claws off of all dogs "just in case."

In case you don't belong to a training club, take the dogs out everyday. Begin by walking them at a distance near a children's play ground. Kids at play do a lot of screaming, and it echoes through the trees, so it gives the same type impression of a dog show in a building. There you'll also be able to find access paths that are heavily used, where you can set up a table. I wouldn't allow children to pet the dog or visit with it, until you are sure that a lot of progress has been made. I have also set up my table near the front door of a convenient market, like the ones you see with gas stations (if you do that ask permission first). The owner may want to pet the dog to be sure it won't bite someone. I have also taken the shy dogs to a flea market, and set up my table at the end of a row of outside vendors. You might also want to check with the management before doing that too, so they know you aren't trying to sell your dogs. I made a sign to put on the edge of the table merely asking people coming up to pet the dogs. That's a great way to get the dog used to a lot of different smell, as it's amazing how many people with different walks in life visit flea markets.

I don't know if you've tried this or not ... but when you give a dog a job, it distracts the mind from all the negative things in the environment that can cause fearfulness. So first I would teach the dog to pay close attention to you! You can do that by allowing the dog to run around while you are cleaning the house, working in the kitchen, etc. and every few minutes, call the dog's name, the second it looks at you say "yes", and toss a treat. Then teach the dog to "target." So when the dog is on the table, and people are coming to check it over, you let the dog target something, like looking at your eyes, toy or use a finger. Using a clicker can help set up the target, but I've just used the "yes" to lock in the action I was looking for. Whatever training technique you chose, you need to do it several times a day. Don't train more than one technique at a time. Don't try to train a dog to target when it's out standing on the table somewhere. Teach the target at home, then with a little distraction. The idea is to take training in steps so you don't overwhelm the dog. Make training into a game.

Quite often our dogs can suddenly get an imbalanced of their spiritual energy, that will affect their personality, and it can happen due to illness, scary experiences, or things of which I'm unaware. If you're not getting results from your training after a while, maybe you should ask around among your dog friends for a Reiki practitioner that can convey some healing energy to him. I was surprised to learn that many dog exhibitors do Reiki. I'd recommend finding one that is at least a Reiki II, as new Reiki practitioners don't always have enough experience to know how much energy they are conveying to a small dog. I would not think it wise to have Reiki done at the dog show before showing, as they usually get so relaxed they can't show! It just depends on the situation and the dog. A friend had a Minpin that stressed when showing so that her muscles tightened up, and that made her look lame. A short Reiki session 15 min. before going in made her relax enough that she showed with smooth movement, and she beat my Minpin, two days in a row and finished with the majors she needed. It might only take one Reiki session, or it could take a couple.

Another most important thing you can do is talk to the dog. Don't tell him it's OK ... explain to him why you show, how beautiful he is, how important he is, and complement him each time he shows confidence. I would also talk to him about everything that is going on at a show, and if the judge isn't close enough to hear you, I would even whisper things to him that has helped him to relax on other occasions. I had a Minpin that I used to say "tick, tock" too all the while she was showing. I was looking for a sound that distracted her, and that worked. She would cock her head and look at me and it was the best attention getter I had. You might tell him how nice the judge is. Yes ... people may think me crazy, but animals know what you are saying to them. Just because they don't speak, doesn't mean they don't know human language. And they will read your mental pictures and thoughts as quick as they pick up on speech. So be careful what you think of while waiting to show and while in the ring. When you speak to your dog, show respect for his intelligence. The dog will love you for it and be more willing to do whatever he understands you need. Be specific as you convey what you need him to do. Don't be a crutch for him. Stand as far away from him as you can, still keeping one of your hands on him at all times, as it gives him security. And let me also say, that dogs are like us, in that they can misunderstand what's going on or being thought about them. Sometimes it will make a dog "angry" and they will just quit, or give up showing for that judge. On more than one occasion, when there's been a cut, where we have to leave the ring, one of my dogs, and most particularly my toy fox, Sunshine will think she's been dismissed, and she will get so "angry" that when I take her back in the ring, it takes a few minutes before I can convince her that she needs to be showing, and that she misunderstood, she hadn't been dismissed when we left the ring. You do something and they get even with you. I've heard it said that dogs aren't that smart, but I know that isn't true. Well that about covers it. Let us know if he comes around for you, and please share what worked and what didn't work. Every dog is different and how you go from a problem to success is a learning experience that we would all love to hear about. (continued from last newsletter)

No subsequent changes can be made to registrations without the breeder's written consent.
- Full Litter Offspring: Gives breeders who have already registered their litters with the AKC a second opportunity to individually register all the puppies in the litter to themselves at a discount, even though the breeder originally selected the traditional litter registration. This is a great opportunity to take advantage of the discounted price and complete the registration process.
- Full Litter PLUS: All puppies in the litter are registered at the time of litter registration, each either in the name of the breeder or of the new puppy buyers. AKC will contact the new puppy buyers to get the name of the puppy. This assures that all puppies have been registered and ownership recorded.
- Full Litter Offspring PLUS: Breeders can register all the puppies in the litter after the litter registration, each either in the name of the breeder or of the new puppy buyers. If not named at time of registration, AKC will contact the new puppy buyers to get the name of the puppy. This assures that all puppies have been registered and ownership recorded.
- Registration at the Time of Sale:
 - A. Breeders ask their puppy buyers to fill out the registration application and provide a \$20.00 check made out to AKC when they pick up their puppy, both of which the breeder then submits for them.
 - B. Breeders go online with their new puppy buyer at the time of puppy pickup and help them complete the registration.
 - C. As a last resort, breeders would give the signed application to the new puppy buyer at time of pick-up and would follow-up with them on the importance of registering their dog.

I want you to be aware of the statistics about our wonderful Toy Fox Terriers. Please find below the number of litters and the number of dogs listed each year from 2001 through 2010. If you notice 2001 to 2004 there was an increase of litters to 234 and dogs registered to 214. In 2005 litters dropped by 26, but dogs increased by 56.

Then in 2006 the number of litters registered started out at 440 and dogs at 724. By 2008 they dropped to 392 litters and dogs increased to 731 (a 7 dog increase), and they have decreased in registration ever since - falling to 285 litters and 522 dogs in 2010.

Conclusion: From 2001 through 2010 (10 year span) the difference is 119 litters and only 34 dogs. I do not know the reason, and would like input from the members as to what is happening in our breed.

Another question I have is, "How many dogs are being registered by UKC?" I wonder if their numbers have also decreased? Anyone being privy to such information, I would like to know and I will share it with the members. I have reasons given such as the economy, puppy mill sales have dwindled (which would be a good thing), dogs not being registered with AKC, and several other reasons.

My question to the members - are we not promoting our breed as we should? I would like to be out there promoting the Breed every chance we get, but the parent club does not have the money to do such promotions. We have opportunities to participate in Meet The Breed events, and provide seminars to the public and judges organizations, but it takes money for travel, lodging, food and materials for those willing to give of their time to perform such services. Does anyone have a solution as to a means to provide such funds?

I personally believe that when we address the suggested changes in the Standard, it will once again provide a blueprint that breeders, exhibitors, and judges can better follow and understand - and our breed will once again become a breed that people want to own and will achieve the recognition it so dearly deserves.

Now that the stud book is again open, many of the bloodlines that did not get registered now have that opportunity. I also understand that the people that now have many of the lines that were owned by several deceased people will hopefully now take the opportunity to register them. Several members have contacted me saying they had friends who would like to get their dogs registered with AKC.
