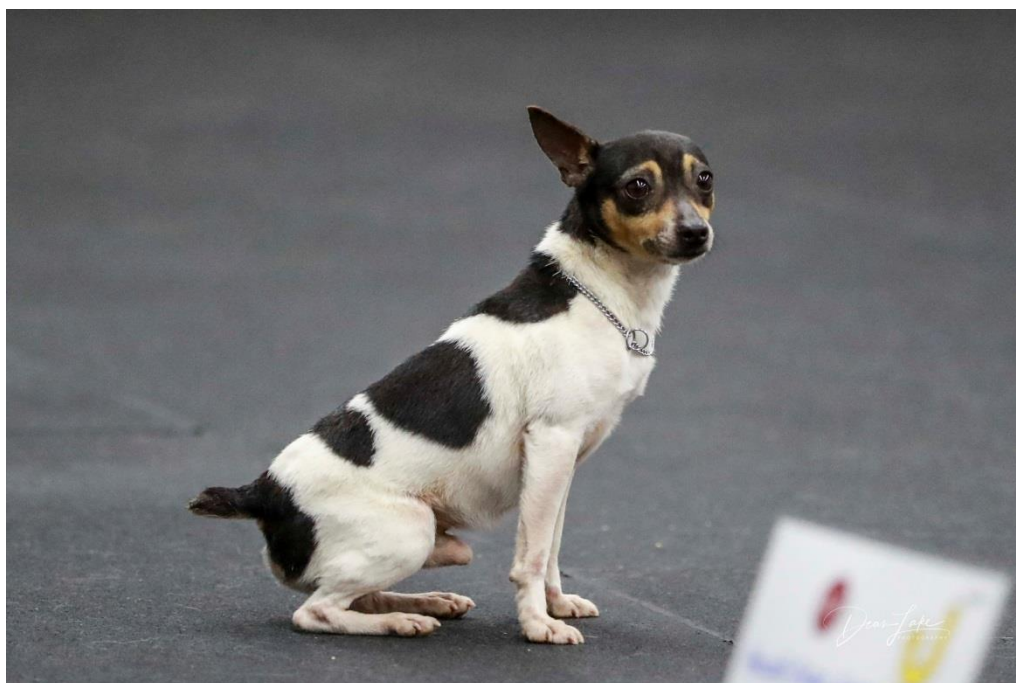

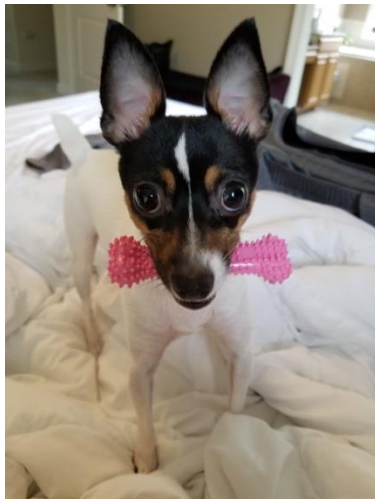
Message from the Editor

SO YOU THINK AGILITY MIGHT BE FUN TO DO.....AND YOU ARE CORRECT!

If, at some time, you have entertained giving agility a try, here are a few thoughts to get you started, which are obviously influenced by my own experiences:

- (A) You do NOT need to be young or athletic to be successful. This might be a good place to mention that there are even more ways to define “success” than there are ways to teach the weave poles! Unlike other dog related endeavors, in agility you can set (and adjust) your goals according to your own priorities. The only goal that should be universally imperative is enjoyment for your team mate and subsequently, for yourself!
- (B) Your dog does not need to be obedience trained, although “sit”, “down” and “come” are useful both in agility and generally in life.
- (C) You do not need a big yard (or any yard at all) or lots of equipment. Both do make training easier of course, but with some creativity, are not necessary. Our breed definitely has a size advantage when it comes to setting up a jump in the living room!
- (D) There is NO substitute for finding a good trainer to train you how to best train your dog and to train you how to handle appropriately. You cannot learn agility from a book. Don’t get me wrong. I love books for many things (I taught my first sheltie obedience from a book at age 9), but NOT agility. Finding a good (and compatible) trainer is not always easy. Depending on the involvement in local dog sports or organizations, it may be as easy as getting a recommendation from a friend or you may need to go to some nearby trials and ask locals for ideas. Don’t be afraid to trust your instincts—if your prospective trainer seems harsh, not concerned with dog safety (both with equipment and class control) or makes you uncomfortable, RUN! Your trainer will become part of your “team”, so choose wisely. On your part, you need to be able to take criticism well, because I can guarantee it will be warranted. And be straight-forward with your trainer by persisting until you truly do understand. We all learn differently—I need to know the theory or the “why” behind needing to do something a specific way, but you may do better by rote or by example. It takes some time for a trainer to get to know you and your dog (and possibly your breed), so do be patient. Foundation work is just as it sounds—your basics, so do not plan to do it quickly and rush on to “fun” on obstacles even if your dog “seems to get it”! If Foxy jumps off the teeter or dog walk due to not having been thoroughly trained in the preliminary foundation steps, he can suffer physical or mental damage of long-lasting or even permanent duration, thus ending an agility career before it even begins.

With proper guidance, your Toy Fox will likely learn quickly, you not nearly so! This leads me to what I personally consider the “magic” part of agility—in a very short time after grasping the basics, your dog will instinctively read your body language as it pertains to agility (just as he reads the motions prior to food prep or a car ride) and your biggest obstacle will be to learn to give only the correct and pertinent information in a timely fashion for your skilled team mate to interpret and act upon. Your dog will NOT read you incorrectly, but you may well miscommunicate to him!

For me, agility is about the journey, not the destination—ENJOY!

Starting To Finish

Attention! Attention! Attention!

WE WANT IT FOR OUR DOGS throughout their obedience careers, and without it, the road to titles and competitive scores will be expensive and long, maybe endless. So how do we ingrain it into our dogs? When do we begin emphasizing this habit?

In the very beginning, when the puppy first comes home. At that time, it's play and fun for both of us. What the puppy absorbs as a baby, she will have forever.

In my opinion, attention begins with the bond we develop with the dog. Who wants to pay attention to someone he or she doesn't really know or value as a companion? Dog or human, I wouldn't. It's the beginning when you give your puppy undivided attention the first two or three weeks it's in its new home. I take time off from everything to devote it to the new dog. (The same applies if the new resident is an older dog or a rescue. They need it even more than a puppy.) Use the time to play. Use the time to cuddle the puppy on your lap and let it go to sleep there. Use the time to get it used to your voice, a gentle loving voice when it behaves and a stern one when it doesn't accident in the house, taking your possessions and especially chewing fingers, hands and any other part of your body.

The time we spend with the young dog (and older ones) is the most important training tool we can use. Neglected, it can never be recaptured.

Foundation skills should also be part of this dedicated time. Have treats ready and when the pup comes to you, praise and give a small treat. It should be something more tasty than bits of its food kibble. Puppies learn to sit quickly and easily with a treat in the hand, raising it above the dog's nose and saying, "sit." Same with down: treat in front of nose, move it straight down to the floor, then slightly forward while saying "down."

Decide on the word you want to use on the recall in the ring and start getting puppy used to it. Call pup from a close distance and when it moves toward you, treat and lots of excited praise. Play with pup petting, let it roll on the floor and get its tummy rubbed. Always coming to you should be the most wonderful experience in the world for the pup and you have to make it that with sincere praise and excitement. You can gradually increase the distance from which you call, as pup comes to understand the word and reward.

Of course, NEVER, NEVER reprimand the pup when it comes to you, even if it's done something unacceptable. Don't

call it to give it medicine, take something away from it, hurry it into its crate because you're behind schedule and have to get to work or an appointment. If it must be hurried outside after an accident, go to it and take it outside to its elimination spot and tell it to do its business. Use the same word every time. You'll be surprised how quickly it learns to go on command, an invaluable skill when you go to a show or other away-from-home trips. Likewise, if it's chewing something or bothering another dog or needs to be leashed, go to the dog and take care of the problem there. Coming to you must be pleasant.

Take the pup into the yard or other safe, enclosed space. Attach a long line (it can be a clothesline rope, lunge line or some other light material. I wouldn't use a Flexi-lead at this stage.) Let the pup wander around and explore. When it's a short distance from you, turn and walk in the opposite direction no calling or jerking on the rope. The pup will move toward you as the line tightens. Praise if it come to you, treat, and repeat. This starts the dog learning to keep with you, even when it has substantial freedom to do as it pleases.

As the pup matures and is ready to start formal training, the attention you ask for becomes more consistent. There are many theories as to how to instill attention while heeling and doing other exercises. Other *Front & Finish* writers have outlined in detail how to teach and keep the "watch," and will probably do so in future issues of this magazine. One is teaching the dog to raise its head to keep its eyes on your face.

Obviously it works well for many of the nation's top competitive dogs.

I disagree with this method for several reasons, and have never demanded it of my dogs in heeling. The only time I demand, "watch" on my face with eye contact is for the utility signals and utility directed jumping.

Among the reasons I do not teach the head up "watch" is that it is a strain on the dog's neck structure. Imaging yourself walking with your head up and turned. Try it. It makes my neck hurt. Moreover, it really is an unnatural position. Although the official AKC Obedience Regulations do not refer to the position of the dog's head except that it must maintain heel position they do state, "the OBEDIENCE REGULATIONS place emphasis on handling that appears natural." (Page 13, obedience judges guidelines)

It's a fact that dogs have pretty good peripheral vision. They can watch the left leg that tells them what the handler

is doing or going to do. My practice is to teach my dog that my left leg is her Bible. They mind my left leg in straight line heeling, left and right turns, about turns, changes of speed and halts. Of course it takes time and practice for them to make this attention a habit, as in any other method. It may not be the way the majority of exhibitors heel, but I have earned many 40s in heeling, so obviously it works.

Praise and encouragement for a dog learning attention are musts. Don't ask a novice dog to give attention for very long periods of time—gradually increase the length of attention heeling as the dog learns and understands. A cautionary note:

taking a walk or between exercises should not be done with your ring "heel" command. In the ring you can't enforce it and if a dog learns to wander or go wide or otherwise stay out of heel position, it leans it doesn't have to obey the formal heel command when you give it. You can keep your dog properly close to you with a more casual command such as "by me" or "with me" or another word you use consistently.

Try not to be in a hurry to decide to show your dog. You may always feel he or she isn't ready. It will be. But be grounded in the basics and get your dog reliable in practice before you go to trial.

somewhat stressed the day before and I guess they were trying for more focus. While the handler had the dog heeling beside her, the other individual was behind him putting a little pressure on the lead so the handler could give corrections when he fell behind. The result was a disaster as the little dog went into almost shutdown once the heeling pattern began.

The above is a great technique, especially for dogs that are simply not putting out a 100% effort. But, when it's stress that's causing the problem, proofing it with even more stressful work may not be the way to go. Depends on the dog; depends on the situation. But if you have a dog that is soft and already falling a bit apart, I don't think stressing them further with more proofing is the way to go.

Did Jolt come back to doing fronts? Yes, he did. I didn't do anything special—just lots and lots of motivated fronts and 100% consistency so he'd always know what to expect. It was interesting, however, that I had to be careful with the amount of practice he did. I don't really attend that many obedience trials because agility generally takes precedence so wanted to be sure we were ready for the two weekends of trials coming up. That meant I had to pack a lot of work into a

short amount of time. We did—I once again brought articles into the living room where we could have short, enthusiastic practices during the day. At the next weekend of trials, he was a very stressed little boy, even though the venue was small, uncrowded and very quiet. I think he was worried because we had worked so often throughout the week. So I gave him many days off the following two weeks and at the next trials, he was a happier camper.

As much as I like the idea of proofing and use it with my other two dogs and recommend it to many students, some common sense must be put into play before too much proofing is employed. And, with the very soft dogs, you may have to simply forgo it. Because Jolt is always trying to do the right thing, presenting him with a situation that would even imply that he'd do wrong (such as tossing the toy off to the side while he was coming front) just didn't sit right and threw him off balance.

Your soft dog could be different and may be able to handle a bit more than Jolt. Deciding what might be the right thing to do is what makes you a better dog trainer. At least that's the way I look at it but, then, mine is usually the minority point of view.

Proofing (or not) the Marshmallow Dog

JULY 1ST I had a total knee replacement. A few weeks later I was down at the training building, tentatively trying to do a little work with my marshmallow dog, Jolt. I couldn't walk well enough or fast enough to practice heeling so worked a bit on fronts and finishes. Just a few minutes because standing for too long wasn't comfortable.

I progressed really well through rehabilitation and soon contemplated obedience trials scheduled for mid-August. Again, my training routine was relatively short but we began working on various parts of utility. Suddenly, seemingly from nowhere, a new problem arose—Jolt would freeze when he got about five feet away. As those of you who read this column know, Jolt and I went through months of work correcting his go-outs, which were consistently to the left or right of center but never down the middle. I never did figure out what caused the problem or, really, what fixed it, but his go-outs now were quite straight and secure. The jumps have never been a problem. So, why he would do a nice go-out, take the correct jump and then come to an absolute halt halfway to me was beyond my comprehension. Nevertheless, we had a new and very serious problem.

I've been in this game long enough to know that a serious correction when the dog was coming to front could leave you with a dog who would always stay an arm's length away, so I knew I hadn't done that. Actually, almost to a fault, I generally reward him on fronts with cheese dropped from my mouth. I figured this couldn't be too serious and he would get over it soon but that wasn't to be. The problem escalated to his freezing on the recall and articles, too. With only two weeks to go before a three-day weekend of trials, all I could do was motivate, motivate, motivate. I used toys. I used food. I used encouragement. I used prayer.

He did relatively well at the obedience trials, always placing when he qualified BUT he flunked one open and one utility, both for freezing on his way back. Once was on a recall and once on articles.

I racked my brain trying to figure out what might have caused this problem and finally remembered that as a little bit of proofing on his fronts, when we first got back to work, I had tossed his rat toy on the ground just as he was returning to me. He froze in horror, not knowing what to do. I tried to

work him through it, letting him know it was okay for him to come by the rat, but finally had to give up and not use it again. It is now obvious to me that this was simply something I couldn't do with Jolt.

I believe in proofing. But I don't like some of the really heavy and awful proofing some people do because I think it isn't fair. However, what is fair for one dog is not fair for another. To get Nicky's absolute attention on signals, I would throw a toy to the side of me at the same time I gave a signal. If he looked at the toy and missed the signal, I would correct him. The correction wasn't severe but enough to let Nicky know that he had to watch me no matter what.

When I started signals with Jolt, I knew in my heart of hearts that this was something I could never do with him. Without his absolute trust, it would never work. Jolt has never been proofed on signals, but it's okay. He does them just fine.

Actually, Jolt has hardly ever been seriously proofed on anything. I think the soft marshmallow dogs need consistency and, most of all, they need to be able to trust. Remember, I've said many times that it's vitally important to build a soft dog's self-confidence. If the rules keep changing, they never know quite what to believe.

Just to try something a tiny bit different, one day in practice I put Jolt's article out in the pile; then, right after he went to get it, I moved off to the side so he'd have to work harder to come in and find front. Well, that didn't work. He became so unnerved at my moving that he froze for a minute and then brought me the right article. I gave him a big smile and a hug and sent him again. He was a bit uncertain, probably wondering where I might go this time, but worked through it. It certainly demonstrated how vital it was for me to think carefully before changing his rules again.

How many handlers take the time to try to understand this about their soft and/or stressed dogs? Too many, I think, are obsessed by what they see as a need for continuous proofing, even when the dog or circumstances dictate that it might be the wrong thing to do.

I was watching two individuals practicing before one of their dogs went into the ring. The dog's heeling had been
